

## Creation Care Tip: Protecting Fruit Trees and Plants During Freezing Weather

You may notice that we cover our fruit trees and Mosaic Garden plants when the temperatures dip. We've consulted the experts at UF/IFAS Extension Service for the details on the best practices for protecting plants, and share those with you here.

## How to best cover your plants, from the experts:

- Use a non-plastic covering. Frost cloths can be found at hardware stores and garden centers, or large blankets or bedsheets also work.
- The covering should drape over the plant and reach the ground. Use bricks or other weights to hold the covering to the ground.
- Do not "lollipop" young trees, essentially covering the leaves and branches and tying it off at the upper trunk. This does not protect the tree.

Less cold-tolerant plants are going to get knocked back once we get temperatures below 40 degrees, and they would likely die once we get to 32 degrees and below. For cold-sensitive crops, like certain citrus, when we get to the mid- or upper-20's, young trees should be protected.

Proper covering techniques make all the difference. Instead of sheets or blankets, we have had better results with reusable frost cloth that is made for this purpose. Surrounding the base with holiday lights also helps keep the trees warm.

Wire or PVC hoops can be used to help secure frost cloth and keep the cloth from damaging sensitive plant stems and leaves. Bricks, sticks, soil, or garden staples should be used along the perimeter of the frost cloth to prevent nighttime gusts from blowing the cloth off your garden beds or landscape plants.

## **MANNA ON MERIDIAN**

2023 was an exciting year at Manna on Meridian. During this past year we expanded our footprint within our Community, secured a donation of peanut butter from Southwest Georgia farmers valued at over \$6,000, formalized our relationship with Second Harvest of the Big Bend (SHBB), and began a partnership with Publix through SHBB to provide weekly bread and baked goods to our neighbors on Sundays. We served dry goods and fresh produce to over 3,200 families this past year at an average cost of approximately \$22 per household. The average number of people in each household is 3 so we reached over 9,600 individuals last year. Our partnership with SHBB will help us continue to bring down cost per household in 2024, but your continued financial support would be greatly appreciated so we can continue to support our neighbors.

In 2020, we served approximately 1,980 households, averaging 165 per month.

In 2021, we served approximately 2,390 households, averaging 199 per month.

In 2022, we served approximately 3,120 households, averaging 260 per month.

In 2023, we served approximately 3,220 households, averaging 268 per month.

We thank you for your faithful service and continuous commitment to Manna this past year. We hope that the changes you have seen at Manna and the impact you have witnessed will continue to energize you to donate and to volunteer with Manna in 2024.


